

Beginning Quilting
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Tools

- Rotary Cutter
 - Small rotary cutter good for free form
 - Different blades available – scallop for edge of label
 - Blades can be sharpened
 - Quilt after label on – can't be removed easily
- Scissors
 - Don't need expensive scissors
 - Those with small, rounded points don't mistakenly cut quilt
 - Embroidery for trimming
 - Duck bills (rounded blades) for appliqué trimming
- Seam Ripper
- Pins
 - 1 ¼"
 - Silk – sharper and finer
 - Plastic heads for design board
 - Flower head from Clotilde – extra fine
- Rulers
 - Those with thin lines enhance precision cutting
 - 24" to extend whole width of fabric
 - Use same ruler for whole project
 - Hold ruler down with finger off the ruler on fabric so ruler doesn't move, move hand

- Easy angles and triangles simplify cutting
- If you can only have one square ruler, get a 12 ½"
- Scale ruler with job you want to do (large for larger projects, smaller for small projects)
- Good practice to cut and complete one block first to discover problems

Pre-washing

- Personal Choice
- Zig zag edges prior to washing
- Press flat, press with straight of grain
- Square up by matching selvages
- Fold so no wrinkles show
- Press in crease
- Line up crease with line on cutting mat
- Find edge with smallest width, line up ruler and cut off
